I came to Lincolnshire in a very hot 1975, moving with my husband's job to Nettleham. I was born, lived, and worked in Nottingham up until then and I can tell you some Lincolnshire-isms certainly had me confused!!

In Nottingham I had worked for Social Services in Child Care, which I continued to do in Lincolnshire until my two children were born. As anyone with children will know, you quickly become immersed in village life!

I became an active member of St John Ambulance, teaching several care subjects to young cadets. I moved on with St John becoming a county staff member looking at training and Safeguarding.

As the children started primary school, I also went back to school working as a classroom assistant. On a visit to Lincoln college and during a very cheeky conversation I was offered a job teaching nursery nurses. I spent 20 years working

at Lincoln college in the Health and Social care department, completing my Certificate in Education and becoming a National Training Verifier for St John Ambulance. Which led to a wonderful experience in Trinidad and Tobago training trainers, although it was a bit off putting when a cockroach flew out of the mouth of a manikin I was just about to breathe into!!!

I finished my career as the qualifications co-ordinator with Lincolnshire Police. I spent a fair amount of my time assessing assessors, who could be assessing any manner of roles within this service – interesting!!!

We moved to Sturton by Stow to be nearer the grandchildren and to help with childcare, I didn't realise this would mean home schooling as they are now both in their teens!! The move to Sturton also saw me join the WI, an organisation I have become very passionate about. I want to educate younger women about the WI and the excellent work that this organisation has achieved over the years and try to dispel the old 'Jam and Jerusalem' image which unfortunately we still seem to have.

One interpretation of this phrase can relate to the ability to inspire others to greater things We have plenty of these in our Federation and would love to celebrate them, if you have a member with the ability to inspire others we would love to hear about them.

Inspiring LNFWI Members - Kay Raby 'Mother of Zoom'

In the House of Commons, the oldest male or female MP is designated Father or Mother of the House. For LNFWI, the equivalent 'Mother of Zoom' is Kay Raby, a member of Suttonon-Sea WI and a really inspiring lady.



Kay has been a WI member since 1970, initially in Eaton Socon (Bedfordshire), having been a tutor at various WIs in the area, teaching soft furnishings. After moving to Sutton-on-Sea in 1988, Kay joined the local WI, after seeing them in the local carnival.

Kay has attended many of the Federation Zoom meetings since autumn 2020 and we believe is the oldest 'Federation Zoomer', at 96 years old. Kay is inspiring, as she is the embodiment that age is not a barrier to learning and adapting.

Kay began to learn how to use a computer in her early 70s, to help keep in touch with family living abroad. This initially involved learning how to use email, with the help of tuition from a neighbour, and attending computer classes at the Boatshed in Mablethorpe. This progressed into joining a creative writing group and a Denman course on how to produce leaflets and cards via a computer.

During COVID, Kay read a piece in the LNFWI newsletter, which said if you could use email, you could use Zoom. She asked her son and daughter-in-law to help get her started and they began by organising family Zoom calls. This has helped Kay stay connected with her three children - a son and daughter, based in the UK and another son who is currently in Brazil and having to stay there longer than expected, due to COVID. Kay's computer didn't have a built in camera, but a relatively cheap £10 plug in one meant she was up and running in no time.

This gave Kay the confidence to join in the Federation Zoom events and she also 'attends' the Workers Education Association Zoom calls on a Thursday. These are lectures covering a wide range of topics, such as criminology. She does say that it can sometimes be tiring when you are concentrating on speakers/ lecturers, but she often multi-tasks while Zooming, as her knitting is always on the go!

Kay's motto is that every day is there to be lived and age is no barrier to continuing to learn. She believes it's really important for women to keep as up to date as they can with technology and not allow



their husbands/partners to 'takeover' this task.
With her ability to communicate via a computer, Kay has never felt isolated during the pandemic.

Kay is an incredibly modest lady. She doesn't feel she is exceptional and points out that she's had help to teach her how to use the technology. But I think her attitude and determination are exceptional, as she continues to embrace the opportunity to learn new skills. When I interviewed Kay for this

article, it struck me that as someone who is over 40 years younger, my generation should learn from Kay and ensure we keep up to date with technological changes, to ensure that we become the next 'Mother of Zoom' - or whatever we have in 30 years time!

ANOTHER INSPIRING WOMAN

Authorpe WI celebrates a member who has done so much for her fellow members over the difficult 18 months or so of the pandemic. This is a short version of Susan Wallace's submission.

Who'd have thought that ill health and lockdowns would lead to a new hobby? At the start of the first lockdown, last year, I'd just had an operation which required three to six months' recovery. We'd only moved



into our house a few months previously and the former owner had left behind all sorts of things, including 25kg of air dry clay.

I decided to have a play with it to keep myself occupied while I recuperated. I'd never done any clay modelling of any kind before and really had no clue what I was doing. I started by trying to make a model of a coral reef, which I don't think it was the easiest thing for a beginner!

The first thing I made was a clownfish in the tentacles of a sea anemone,

which I painted with acrylic paints. I also made some starfish and different types of coral. Then I had a go at making some fish, and a shell with a hermit crab in it. I put all the bits together by

sticking them on a piece of wall tile. This is the finished article.

I might go on a course to learn how to do it properly, though!
