

They thought they would be blown away on the hill top, but the weather was very kind to them on what turned out to be a beautiful sunny day.





My Viking Way Scarf Story

Pam Stratford of Tetford WI writes:

In the July edition of the WI News there was an article by Jean Burgess entitled "Are you up for a Challenge?" Our challenge was to make scarves the same length as The Viking Way. With the average scarf length being about 70" we would need to make about 116,500 scarves between July and the end of October.

At the June Meeting of Tetford WI One of our members brought a big bag of wool, I shared the wool and bought some wool from charity shops and started knitting my first scarf. Wool had also been donated to WI House, as I used mine up I would visit WI House, collect more and continue to make them.

Four months later I have made 28 scarves to a total length of 2101" which is an average length of each scarf of 75" or 6' 3", this equates to 1/30th of a mile.

I am now waiting to hear where to take the finished scarves that will then be donated to charities and groups supporting the homeless within the Federations.

Sutton on Sea Wi's speaker for November was Alex Hull from Coastal Distilleries. Alex gave an insight into making gin and vodka and the range of flavours, some traditional and some new. Members were then allowed to taste some of the products and order if they wished.

At **North Somercotes WI** meeting, Dale Gibson waxed lyrical about his beloved honey bees to the delight of the audience, who buzzed with questions. Not only did they learn about the life cycle of the bees but also how they function as a unit.

With actions mirroring the bees as they work, Dale not only enthralled, but raised awareness of the bees in the balance of nature.

Viking Way Knitting challenge

Thank you to everyone who took part in the Viking Way knitting challenge – and to those who logged their lengths.

It has been fantastic to hear about you getting together to knit, crochet and chat. Some members have picked up their needles again after many years – and some created their own personal challenge to knit for the first time.

So, the final total length achieved was just under two miles.

It was a tall order to get the whole length of the Viking Way (147 miles) – this would have required around 180,000 scarves. As it is, more than 1,000 scarves were created.

More importantly, it was the activity and friendship that is the most valued – and our results will go on to help others.

So what happens now?

If you know of a project near you that would appreciate some scarves, please pass them on – but let us know where they have gone – and how many – so we can keep track.

Already, some have gone to a homeless project in Mablethorpe and across Lincolnshire South, a number of projects, both in the county and beyond, have benefited from their scarves.

Alternatively, take them along to WI House in Horncastle or pass them on to one of the Federation trustees, who will ensure they get there.

Resolutions Shortlist for 2022

The 38 resolutions submitted this year were whittled down to five for the shortlist during a full day of deliberation on Zoom back in October. You will be reading about them in WI Life and notes and Powerpoint presentations are available on MYWI. Briefly, the resolutions are

<u>Fit for Purpose</u>, <u>Fit for Girls</u> – calling on clothing manufacturers to produce clothes for girls that are equal in quality and design as those for boys to enable them to feel comfortable and confident.

<u>Appropriate Sentencing of Non-Violent Women Offenders</u> – early intervention and community based solutions for women rather than impacting families with custodial sentences.

<u>Equality in Law for the Menopause</u> – to strengthen the Equality Act to include the menopause in the same way as pregnancy and maternity is covered for working women.

More Support for Women and Girls with ASD & ADHD. Many women and girls with these conditions are undiagnosed and more research is needed into the female presentation of what is more often seen as a male condition.

<u>Tackling Digital Exclusion</u> – calling for an increase in investment by the government to tackle lack of Internet connection, lack of access to devices or lack of digital literacy.

That really is a very brief outline of the resolutions and I hope you will take time to look at the notes and discuss them in your WI. The deadline for the voting slips to be at WI House is Monday 14 February –

remember it is one member, one vote – everyone gets a selection slip in WI Life. The tally of votes then goes to NFWI and the overall result will be made known by the end of February.

One or more resolutions may go forward to the Annual Meeting in June next year which at the moment is expected to be a real live one!

Voting will take place at the Annual Meeting. It is important that you make time in your WI at your May meeting to discuss the final resolution(s). Put it in your programme for next year. You then pass on how you want the delegate to vote who'll be representing you in Liverpool.
