

Lincolnshire North Federation of WIs is not only proud to be showcasing the world renowned Red Dress, but is especially pleased that accompanying the dress on this occasion is its creator, Kirstie Macleod.



What began as a sketch on the back of a napkin in 2009 has grown into a global collaborative project, involving hundreds of people from all over the world and on 18th March 2025 at the Stanhope Hall, Horncastle, Kirstie will appear in person, to share her passion, her skills and the amazing dress.

Growing up in various far-flung countries, Kirstie's former years were saturated with contrasting culture, colour, language and experience. Textiles were always present in Kirstie's early life; the women of Kirstie's family all skilled stitchers, knitters and makers, so it was only a matter a time before she herself picked up a needle and thread.

Embroidery soon became a focus. Kirstie was inspired by its diversity and potential for expression. The Red Dress began in 2009 as an investigation into identity and a desire to connect with women without borders and boundaries. As the years unfolded so too did the potential of the garment to become a vehicle for expression and a platform for voices to be heard. The Red Dress has managed to access disparate communities worldwide, allowing connection and conversation between individuals who may never meet in person.

It surprised many of us that the organisation had originated in Jerusalem in the 11th century when the first Knights of St John set up a hospital to provide free medical care for sick pilgrims. The 8 pointed cross worn on the modern day uniform was first worn by the Knights of St John. King Charles III is the Royal Patron.



East Barkwith members and guests were treated to music from Rod Watts, who entertained us playing two saxophones and a clarinet. We all enjoyed hearing music that was relaxing, taking us back to another era through his music. Rod gave an introduction to each tune he played, also relating it to his experience and when he started playing as a younger man. A very enjoyable evening.

NEWS FROM AROUND THE FEDERATION

The Rolling Scones WI welcomed LIVES first responders, Anne Higham and Tim Higham Jones. These trained volunteers are often first on the scene when someone dials 999, arriving ahead of an ambulance to provide critical life-saving support. Tim is also an ambulance call taker and explained the job is to quickly assess the nature of the emergency and determine the most appropriate service to dispatch. They can also talk a caller through cardiac emergencies, helping to keep the patient alive until one of the services can get to the location to take over.

Skellingthorpe WI welcomed Roland Johns from Lincolnshire Emergency Blood Bike Service Most of the ladies have seen the Blood Bikes dashing about, so it was good to hear a little of its background and the silent, unsung heroes on two wheels that transport vital medical supplies to hospitals. As well as dashing round the county providing blood to hospitals, they also carry plasma, breast milk, platelets and organs to wherever they are needed. All vehicles, cars and bikes are funded by kind and much needed donations.

Somercotes Group members enjoyed a remarkable visit to Floral Media near Newark where we were treated to a tour of the garden, a talk on the evolving business, a flower demonstration and the most delicious lunch. The trip was so enjoyable members wish to go again.

South Elkington WI: 16 members travelled by coach to see "The Longest Yarn. We also welcomed Chris Suich, who talked about "Bob's Brainwaves" the charity set up by Chris after her husband, Bob, developed dementia soon after retirement. "Bob's Brainwaves" provides support and information packs for those living with dementia and their carers.

Tetford & District WI welcomed local historian and author Jean Shaftoe portrayed the life and times of Sir Joseph Banks, one of Lincolnshire's most famous sons. Inheritor of the Revesby Estate and founder of the Revesby Fair, a botanist and explorer, he undertook major voyages of discovery, notably with Captain Cook to Tahiti and Australasia. The thousands of plant species collected helped create Kew Gardens. Mrs Shaftoe brought fresh light to his outstanding legacy, still vitally important today.
